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INTRODUCTION

The Journey Awaits

Ephesians 2:10 NLT
For we are God's masterpiece.
He has created us anew in Christ Jesus,
so we can do the good things he
planned for us long ago.

Can you think of a time when you showed up at a place where no one knew you? Maybe it was the first day at a brand new school or drop-off time at sleepaway camp. Or maybe you enrolled in a special art class or signed up to serve at the local community center. No matter how you got to that place, the fact is no one knew who you were.

Would you introduce yourself as the dancer or reader?

A great artist or a brilliant science student?

As a Christ-follower or a faith skeptic?

In some ways, being "new" provides an opportunity for you to recreate yourself. If your old school friends might have called you the loner girl, maybe in your new school you try to become the social butterfly. Or if you got an unwanted reputation because of a bad "boy" decision, now could be your chance to begin again.

But more important than who you WERE is finding out who you ARE!

I'm not saying the past doesn't matter. Oh it does. Our decisions have the ability to impact our future. (Hang tight, because I'll share with you about how that happened to me later on.) Since we can't change the past, we have to face this day, and tomorrow, with an understanding of who we are. We need to figure out our identity because what we believe about ourselves will impact our decisions and how we go about living the life God has given us.

Our identity can either cause us to curl up in a corner, feeling worthless and rejected, or call us to step out in bold, courageous faith to do *that thing* we long to accomplish.

Don't misunderstand me, though. I'm not saying *that thing* should define us. We need to find our identity — how we define ourselves — in what God has to say about us. When we understand His truth, then we can make decisions that enable us to accomplish *that thing* with a godly purpose.

Who we are is really a matter of Whose we are.

Our identity is established by God as we enter into a relationship with His son, Jesus Christ. When we put our faith in Jesus, by believing that He died on the cross for our sin, we receive a brand new identity that comes from being a member of the family of God.

Ephesians 2:10 NLT

For we are God's masterpiece. He has created us anew in Christ Jesus, so we can do the good things he planned for us long ago.

As Ephesians 2:10 describes, "... we are God's masterpiece... created anew...", but do you know what this means? Do you know what God made you for? Does asking this question frighten you? Or do you think it is pointless to even consider the purpose God has for your life?

According to the Bible, God says we are His precious daughters, masterpieces, made even more beautiful by faith in Christ. He receives us as we are and wants to make us more. . . more like Him. He wants to use our perfectly-designed lives for His purposes. And it is

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in discovering that purpose that we begin to experience the journey to freedom we crave.

I've learned through my own life experiences, and in mentoring teen girls for more than 17 years, that having a sense about why God made us and how He may want to use us is extremely important. Knowing our purpose helps us make wise decisions and avoid the foolish ones, too. But before we can find our purpose, we have to first figure out who we are — we have to know what we believe about ourselves, God, and this world. And that, girls, begins with discovering our identity.

Together, we're going to look at what we believe about ourselves, what God says about who we are, how we're impacted by what others have to say about us, and how we can live in the freedom of embracing our identity in Christ. That's the journey to freedom, girls!

Heavenly Father, thank You that You made us as YOUR masterpiece. God help us to truly believe and accept the truth that You have made us brand new through faith in Your son, Jesus Christ. God, You have good plans for our lives — things that You planned long ago. Help us to remember this truth as we consider our identity today. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

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CHAPTER ONE

Upside Down Freedom

2 Corinthians 5:17 NIV
Therefore, if anyone is in Christ,
the new creation has come:
The old has gone, the new is here!

I remember the very moment I found out I was accepted into the one college I was waiting to hear from. . . waiting for what seemed like forever. Literally, weeks after all the other acceptance letters arrived, I finally found the one in my mailbox. I ran up the driveway excited to share the good news, even though there was no one home to tell. I can't remember what I did next, but I'm sure I called a friend or my mom at work. What I do remember, however, was thinking. . .

"Finally, I'm free. I get to live the rest of my life exactly how I want to live it. I get a clean slate, a fresh start, a new beginning."

Well, if only that was the truth. I wasn't as free as I thought I would be, and it was my own fault. In the weeks leading up to college, I made a really bad decision to start seriously dating a guy from my high school — a guy I had refused since the spring of my senior year. The same guy I turned down going to the prom with because he was rebounding out of a serious relationship. The same guy I wouldn't date because I had this policy to not get involved with anyone at my after-school job. But this guy pursued me hard, and I gave in.

Girls, we like to be pursued, which inevitably makes us vulnerable and sometimes even foolish.

It's still amazing to me that I could go from "NO way" to "Bring it on!" — what on earth happened to me? Suddenly, I thought this was the man of my dreams, and I gave him all of mine. We planned our future marriage and discussed the names of our babies. I was romanced right into fairy-tale land and gave up everything for this boy . . . everything, if you know what I mean.

There I was as a college freshman, thinking I was so free to do whatever I wanted with my life, but in reality I was interlocking my soul with another human being who had no intentions of caring for me forever. Within six months, we broke up (my initiative), because I knew I lost the essence of myself in this relationship. I was crumbling into the shadows of this guy, watching my dreams dashed and stomped on by a boy not worthy of sharing them with me. It was either get out with whatever I had left, or stick with the biggest mistake of my life.

In the weeks to follow, I really learned how foolish I had been to date him in the first place. Can you believe he was cheating on me with his ex-girlfriend, who attended another college in the region? Talk about feeling crushed and humiliated. My worth felt the size of pea. Maybe even smaller. All these thoughts formed in my head and heart, like:

I'm not even worth being loved.

I can never trust anyone again.

I'm nothing but used goods.

I'll never be able to use those names for my children now.

Maybe I'll never even be a mom.

Will I ever find someone to love me and not betray me?

I'm not sure how I made it through the next few months without making any more life-changing, foolish decisions. Looking back, I'm sure

God's hand was on my life, even before I knew Him personally. Maybe it was the loss of love and sense of self-worth that God used to lure me into a search for something more. The break-up and betrayal was like a bucket of cold water thrown onto my life, leaving me skeptical and guarded in my all my relationships — even with friends. I'm sure, however, that's why I noticed something different in the lives of my summer camp co-workers. There was this group that seemed to have authenticity and a sense of purpose in their lives. They were the ones that skipped happy hour at the local bar on Friday nights, and instead invited me to join them at a church youth event. Even though they knew I didn't share the same philosophy about God, they were willing to spend time with me.

I look back and can see how they loved me with the fullness of Christ's love, and patiently waited for me to recognize Him in them. That's what made me want to know more about their faith and about this God they seemed to love so much. But I was still hesitant to give up my lifestyle and my "other" friends. I tried to balance both worlds but this thing inside of me knew it couldn't be that way forever.

In the fall of my junior year of college, I headed off for a semester in London, and I took with me questions about God and faith and the influences of those summer camp friends. I began to see life through a new lens. I watched my new London roomies make decisions that left them feeling frustrated, disappointed, and guilty. Sometimes, I made those foolish choices, too. Each time, my mind would circle back around to my camp friendships. Each time, I wanted more of what they had.

If my freedom led to foolish decisions and their lack of freedom led to a happier life, then was the freedom I wanted really freedom at all?

That was the question on my heart when I got the news about the death of one of my camp friend's moms. It sent me into a tailspin, even though we knew her battle with cancer was fierce. A week later, I received a Bible in the mail from the friend who shared the news with

me. He wanted me to find comfort in the promises of heaven and the truths found in Scripture, but all it did was frustrate me. So I turned to a new friend, Susie, who lived upstairs. I could tell she was a Christian because she was just like my camp friends. . . and a pastor's kid, too.

I went up to her room and threw the Bible on the bed. I challenged her to tell me what it all meant, and she did the most unlikely thing. She said, "Forget the Bible for a minute." Instead, she asked me a question:

"How do you think you're getting into heaven?"

"Umm. Hmm. Well, I don't think I am!" I replied.

Susie asked me why, and I explained that I thought I broke too many of God's rules. And then she told me the sweetest truth I've ever heard.

God wants your heart.

Not just your rule-following. He wants you to believe that His son, Jesus, died on the cross for the forgiveness of your sins — all those times you broke those rules — so that you could spend eternity with Him in heaven.

Really? This was news to me and, to be honest, it sounded awesome. What a relief to be off the hook, simply by telling God that I believe in my heart that Jesus died for me and all my crazy sins.

Romans 10:9-10 NIV

If you declare with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you profess your faith and are saved.

As you might have figured out, I made the decision that night to believe in Jesus and to start living for Him. Yes, it was rather matter of fact and totally unemotionally. For me, it was all about the promise of

heaven, and a way out of this life. What I didn't know then, however, is that God was going to radically change my life from the inside out.

That freedom I craved — to live on my own, to be my own boss, to find my own happiness — was replaced with a desire to live for God.

Sure, it was a slow start. My habits didn't change at first. My life looked exactly the same the next morning as it did all the days leading up to that moment I said YES to Jesus. But within months, I recognized that if I was going to be an authentic follower of Jesus, I needed to figure out who He really was and what it mean to live for Him.

What I found out is that as I gave up my own freedom and embraced following Christ, I found the purpose and direction I always craved . . . the freedom to really live my life to the fullest. That's upside down freedom, friends! And it's the freedom we crave deep within our souls!

With each passing day, I made new choices about how I was going to live — from the words the came out of my mouth (like giving up cussing) to how I'd be in relationships with guys (choosing purity). As the Bible describes it, I was a new creation and learning how to live like such.

2 Corinthians 5:17 NIV

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!

Even though my life on the outside changed to reflect my new relationship with God, there was still this place in my heart and mind stuck on believing lies. I didn't yet know how to take my thoughts captive and certainly had no idea how to embrace my identity in Christ.

I KNEW I was NEW but didn't KNOW who I was NOW.

In some ways, I was like a little girl playing dress up. I carried the title of Christian and did Christian things, like going to church and attending a Bible study, not really knowing what to think about myself or how those thoughts impacted how I lived. Do you ever feel this way? Well, don't despair! You don't have to live in the shell of a Christian life. First, you need to know God's forgiveness and grace is being held out for you, as it was for me. See, I needed to receive God's forgiveness and not continue to punish myself over the things I regretted doing.

Acts 13:38 NIV

Therefore, my friends, I want you to know that through Jesus the forgiveness of sins is proclaimed to you.

I also had to learn how to live in light of God's grace, receiving this gift even though I felt I didn't deserve it. Receiving it for the past and the present.

Ephesians 2:8-9 NIV

For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast.

Once I embraced God's forgiveness and grace, I still needed to learn how to live differently. And so do you! It's a process that requires changing our thinking so that our habits will change, too. And that change begins with an influences inventory. What do I mean by that? Well, read on.

What's Influencing Your Identity?

I think it is safe to say that one of the reasons we really struggle with knowing our identity in Christ is because we are all too easily influenced by *what* others say about us and by *what* we think of our own accomplishments or actions. We're also influenced by *what* takes up our time, so we need to think seriously about *how* we spend our time, too.

It's Time to Run Free

If we really want to experience the freedom to live our lives as God has designed us to, we need to start with realizing how we are affected by others and our experiences. We have to investigate what we think and why we think that way in the first place.

We have to know our beliefs and really figure out if they are true. Why?

Because what we think influences how we live.

Our beliefs about ourselves, this world, and God impact how we define ourselves — and that definition determines our identity. If our iden-

tity is based on our accomplishments or relationships, then it is forever changing. But if our identity is based on the unchangeable Truth, then we can move through the highs and lows of life without being crushed or thrown off course.

Think about how one ordinary day could go entirely wrong, like:

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Something ugly happened with a friend at school . . .

Your parents are mad about your low grade in history . . .

The boy you like asked someone else to the semi-formal . . .

There's a giant pimple forming right next to your nose . . .
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In that moment, when all those issues are happening to YOU, you feel anything but valuable and worthy. Instead you feel like poop. Yes, I just said a potty word. But isn't that the truth? So what should you do — in that very, poopy feeling moment?

It's in that moment that your identity matters most, especially when it is shaped and established by what God says about you. That's when you have to kick to the curb any lie spinning through your mind and embrace your identity in Christ, as it is defined throughout the Bible. Truths like:

You are made in the image of God!

Christ died on the cross for your

sin . . . their sin . . . that sin!

You are a child of God and He loves you!

You are not defined by how you feel,

or where you failed,

but by your holy status

that God has given you!

Your inheritance in Christ equips

you with power to overcome this mess!

Your position in the family of God means you don't need to go through it alone, but can depend on others around you!

Because of what God has given us through Jesus, we can live with hope, purpose, and the promise of overcoming! But understanding this truth requires a study of Scripture to find out exactly what God says. We will also need the encouragement of Christian mentors, parents, and friends who can help us learn how to read the Word and learn it for ourselves!

You Need a Plan

If you're like the teenage girls I get to mentor, then I'm betting reading your Bible is not exactly something you love doing. Maybe you don't even know where to start, so that's why our first step in the journey to freedom is for you to learn how to read it on your own. It's one thing for me to tell you what the Bible says is true, but what if you want to know something I haven't covered? What if you want to learn something I've not taught you? You need to know the Scriptures for yourself! You need to know how to use God's Word as your journey map.

While there are so many different techniques and study methods, I want to give you one that is super simple and easily accomplished. So are you ready for the challenge?

1. Pick a Bible or Bible App

There are so many Bibles and Bible Apps to choose from, so let me suggest these three options, which I believe are the best:

2. Get a Journal or Notebook

Get creative and personalize a notebook or binder, or pick up an inexpensive journal.

3. Pick a Book of the Bible

Ideally, you can make it a goal to read the whole Bible, one chapter at a time. Yes, this will take you a few years, but what's the rush? Don't know where to start? How about beginning with the list below to get started. The books suggested rotate between the short letters written by Paul, the Gospels, Psalms, Proverbs, and a few Old Testament gems.

4. Read a Chapter a Day

You can choose to read as much or as little as you'd like, but I find a chapter a day is totally doable. You'll feel like you completed something and can easily mark in your Bible where you left off.

5. Write Down What Stands Out

You may think reading is just enough, but there is something that happens in the brain when we actually write down what we're learning. You don't have to take pages and pages of notes. Just write down something like this:

- Date
- Chapter
- Theme of the Chapter
- Main Characters
- What did the main characters do right or wrong?
- What did they learn from what happened?
- What can we learn from what happened?
- What verse(s) really stands out personally?

At first, your commitment to read your Bible may not seem to be accomplishing much, but imagine if you decided to stop washing your hair. For a day or two, it might not be noticeable. But over a week, well, you'd start to notice. Over a month, and well, that would be pretty bad, right? In the same way, you may not notice the results of your Bible reading. It may not make sense to you. You might be totally confused and think the Scriptures are completely irrelevant. But trust me. In time, you'll see your knowledge increase and your understanding

grow. You'll be changed by the truths of Scriptures. It may take days, months, years, but it will happen.

Let me just make this clear. It will take years to see God's transforming work in your life, but it is worth the investment of your time!

I've been reading my Bible almost every day for the last 10 years (yes, that means I didn't do that for the first 10 years of being a Christian) and I still have a ton to learn. I still don't know things, which motivates me to keep on reading and learning from others. That's the journey of faith, girls. You could take an entire lifetime of reading the Scriptures, and there will still be more to discover about God. But imagine if you start now! Imagine what God will do in your life and through your life. Imagine!

Girls, the Lord has called you to be His child and equips you to live this life with His great purposes in mind. It is such a worthy calling in which you get to experience God's power, strength, hope, and joy, no matter your circumstances.

God doesn't promise a happy life, but He promises us a full one!

You'll forever be an imperfect mess, and that is okay. Your life will have problems, but they don't need to define you. Instead, God can work through them — and through you — to show the world His hope and purposes. No matter what you've done in the past, or what mistakes you'll make in the future, your identity in Christ can never be marred. So would you be willing to embrace what God says about you? Will you choose to believe His truth over your feelings? Will you live in the freedom of being you. . . as God defines you?

Heavenly Father, thank You for this journey of freedom that You've given us the privilege to experience. It is so different than what we expect. It is something we have to receive with a measure of

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faith and hope, as we give up what we think we know is true and embrace what You say is true. God, help us through this study, to discover what your Word says about us. Help us to find our identity in Christ and live our lives with the promises of Your purposes established in our hearts. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

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CHAPTER TWO

Take Your Mark

1 Corinthians 9:24 NIV

Don't you realize that in a race everyone runs,
but only one person gets the prize?

So run to win!

When the gun fires at the start of a track meet, everyone knows what just happened. The racers take off out of the starting blocks with their eyes locked in on the finish line. Whether running a 50-yard dash or 4 x 4 relay, they know why they are there and what they're supposed to be doing. Run! Run for the prize!

1 Corinthians 9:24 NIV Don't you realize that in a race everyone runs, but only one person gets the prize? So run to win!

But imagine if the runners showed up unprepared? Think of the shock if a county champion showed up in flip-flops and a bikini? Would she be prepared for her race without her track sneakers or uniform on? Or imagine a state qualifying sprinter talking on the phone instead of getting her feet in the blocks as the gun is about to go off! We'd think she was crazy, right? She'd lose the race for sure!

Well now, stretch your imagination beyond the track meet, because there's another really important race you should think about. See, your life is like a long distance race, for which you train every single day.

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You have to learn how to build up your endurance and condition your body. You have to learn how to get in the mental game and know your own strengths and weakness. You'll have to figure out what to do to prepare for success and what to do when you face failure, too. That's why the Bible compares our life of faith to that of an athlete running a race.

Hebrews 12:1-2 NLT

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a huge crowd of witnesses to the life of faith, let us strip off every weight that slows us down, especially the sin that so easily trips us up. And let us run with endurance the race God has set before us. We do this by keeping our eyes on Jesus, the champion who initiates and perfects our faith.

God wants us to embrace this life He's given us with as much dedication and purpose as that champion athlete showing up for the state qualifying meet. We need to know how to "take our mark" so that we can run this race well. And that starts with knowing how we've been marked — in a good way — by God for this world. It starts with knowing our identity.

Wait a Minute

Before we go any further, let me tell you why I know so much about this "running the race" thing. See, back when I was in high school, I spent a season on the track team. Well, that was only because I'd been injured so many times that I couldn't do what I was really passionate about — dance. After 13 years of dance, I had to give up my dream of one day being a Rockette {I know, a big silly dream}, because I tore up my knees one too many times.

After so many years of being physically active, I couldn't quit sports all-together, but the options were limited. The doctor recommended swimming and running. In the fall, I joined the swim team and did pretty well for a rookie, and in the spring I found myself on the track team, even though I couldn't run to save my life. Slow doesn't even begin to describe my trot back then, and my long distance ability was

equally disappointing. So, my very patient track coach sent me in a new direction. He suggested I become a race walker, and to everyone's surprise, I actually did quite well. I figured out the technique, practiced somewhat diligently, and was ready to be my high school's next star athlete.

At the start of my very first race, the gun went off and I sprinted ahead, edging past the other competitors. Shockingly, I continued to gain on them and captured first place as though I'd been race walking for years. It could have been an amazing celebration. *Could have.* If only I hadn't been disqualified. Yes, I was disqualified because I had spandex leggings on under my running shorts and that was against the rules.

Apparently, I wasn't as prepared to compete as I should have been. It wasn't just about conditioning and mindset. I needed to know the rules, too.

The details matter — which is a truth that pertains to every area of life.

You could say that my little experience with race walking became quite an important life lesson. I learned, in a slightly painful but not life-altering way, that I need to pay attention to the details in every area of my life — especially when it comes to my faith and what God says to us through the Bible. And the Bible was something I didn't know about at all when I was your age. I didn't grow up in a Christian home, and was a crazy teenager who made more than a few bad decisions. When I accepted Jesus as my Savior in college, I had a lot to learn about who God is and what it means to be His child. I've had to really pay attention to what the Bible said about my identity in Christ, because so much of what I believed about myself was formed through what others said — the good, the bad, and the ugly. All those words impacted my life, and not always in a good way.

In the same way I should have paid attention to the race walking rules so that I could have won the race, I've also come to see that God's Word will give me everything I need to be able to run this faith-life race in such a way as to experience the blessing of win.

Hebrews 4:12 NIV

For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart.

I want you to be able to run strong and able, confident and prepared, passionate about finishing well. I want you to know what God says is true, so that you'll have no regrets about how you run this life-race God has given you.

So who are you?

Knowing your identity is like knowing the rules of the race. Identity is about discovering who you are according to what God says is true, and then living in that truth without compromise. This is the key to being authentic and confident, the real deal and not a phony, true to yourself and not swayed by the crowd.

According to Dictionary.com, identity is:

"The condition of being oneself or itself, and not another; condition or character as to who a person or what a thing is; the sense of self, providing sameness and continuity in personality over time; the state of having unique identifying characteristics held by no other person or thing; the individual characteristics by which a person or thing is recognized."

Most people assume that identity is about fancy titles, degrees, and accomplishments, like class president, captain of the soccer team, graduate with honors, PhD, senator, or published author. But these titles don't point to a person's identity. Rather, they describe a person's accomplishments or responsibilities.

Identity is about your God-given uniqueness manifested in the plans He has for your life.

You are not an accident or a mistake. Everything from how you look, your personality, passions, strengths, weaknesses, gifts and talents are all a part of God's master design. There is no one else like you! He set you apart as one of His fearfully and wonderfully made creations, designed to be used for a good purpose, right here, right now.

Psalm 139:14 MSG

Oh yes, you shaped me first inside, then out;
you formed me in my mother's womb.

I thank you, High God—you're breathtaking!
Body and soul, I am marvelously made!
I worship in adoration—what a creation!

You know me inside and out,
you know every bone in my body;

You know exactly how I was made, bit by bit,
how I was sculpted from nothing into something.

Like an open book, you watched me grow from conception to birth;
all the stages of my life were spread out before you,

The days of my life all prepared
before I'd even lived one day.

In order to really uncover your true identity, however, you need to figure out for yourself where your source of truth is going to come from.

Will it be God's Word or what others say?
Will it be through receiving Jesus as your Lord and Savior?
Will you receive God's gift of salvation — the promise that He's rescued you from your sin, saving you for heaven and giving you purpose for this life on earth?
Will you turn in another direction?

Maybe your decision should be based on what God says of you and what He promises to those who call Him Lord. Promises like these:

Ephesians 1:3-6 MSG How blessed is God! And what a blessing he is! He's the Father of our Master, Jesus Christ, and takes us to the high places of blessing in him. Long before he laid down earth's foundations, he had us in mind, had settled on us as the focus of his love, to be made whole and holy by his love. Long, long ago he decided to adopt us into his family through Jesus Christ. (What pleasure he took in planning this!) He wanted us to enter into the celebration of his lavish gift-giving by the hand of his beloved Son.

If you accept your place in God's family, you no longer need to define yourself by your own goodness. Instead, you can rest in God's grace.

Isn't it freeing to know that a perfect, holy God can have room in His heart for imperfect, but holy, children?

Yes, holy. I know that may surprise you, but holiness is the foundation of your identity as a child of God.

Why Identity and Holiness Go Together

What do you think holiness means? Is it something that shouldn't be touched? Or is it something religious? The word holy means "set apart or sacred." That certainly describes God, right? We know He is holy, because that is how the Bible describes Him.

Isaiah 6:3
And they were calling to one another: "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory."

Did you know holy is the only word repeated three times in a row to describe God? I guess that means it is a pretty big deal. But what does God's holiness have to do with you and your identity? Well let me explain. It starts with Jesus, who also happens to also be holy. As we read in Luke, when Jesus' birth was announced, He was called the Holy One.

Luke 1:35

The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God."

Both God and Jesus are holy. When we become a part of God's family through faith in Christ, we become holy — this is part of our inheritance simply because God promises to work it out this way.

Hebrews 10:10, 14

And by that will, we have been made holy through the sacrifice of the body of Jesus Christ once for all. . . because by one sacrifice he has made perfect forever those who are being made holy.

As children within the family of God, we take on the attributes of our Father in heaven. It's kind of like the way a mother and daughter may sound alike, look alike, and even have the same mannerism. The mom doesn't have to try to make the daughter like her. It just happens! Maybe that's because through salvation, God also gives us the gift of the Holy Spirit to dwell within us.

Ephesians 1:13

And you also were included in Christ when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation. Having believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit. . .

So, yes, we are holy through becoming part of God's family, and also marked by holiness through the Holy Spirit living within us. We are more than skin and bones brought into this world. We are more than the sum of all our accomplishments. We are more than the sordidness of all our sin. We are holy children of a holy God and we are called to live in a way that is holy.

1 Peter 1:15-16

But just as he who called you is holy, so be holy in all you do; for it is written: 'Be holy, because I am holy.'

You may be wondering, but how do I actually live holy? Does that mean I have to be perfect? No, not at all. But as a child of God, it

is certainly reasonable to strive toward obeying God and pursuing a life of holiness — a life that is set apart. And, that girlfriend, is why knowing your identity in Christ is so important. It will influence your choices and the ways you choose to be set apart, different, and unique for all the right reasons. Yes, your holy status, your identity in Christ, will impact your friendships and who you date. It will affect where you want to work and who you might want to live with in college. It will even influence your career choice and the ways you choose to spend your free time. . . and financial resources. Did you know that being holy could ever mean so much?

Now Imagine a New Identity

Let's go back to imagining that moment when you've just showed up as the newbie. Pretend like you're going to a party this weekend, hosted by a good friend, but the guest list includes people you've never met before. You spend time figuring out what to wear and when to arrive, hoping to make a good first impression. When you walk in the front door, the crowd is loud and every corner of the house is packed with warm bodies. There's no hope of finding your friend, nor being able to stick with her for the evening. You'll have to get into the mix and introduce yourself again and again.

What will you say?
How will you describe yourself?
Will it be based on feelings?
Accomplishments?
Dreams?
Will you be honest?
Authentic?
Fake?
Transparent?

Chances are, you'll tell people your name and what you do, like 40

playing a sport or leading a club at school. You'll panic, trying to come up with an impressive list of things that describe you in order to feel more valuable. In the back of your mind, you might even think about what other people have said about you. That little voice in your head whispers. . .

I am so	!		
If only I wasn't so _			
I wish I was		!	

What would you fill your blank in with? Stupid, fat, ugly, smart, pretty, better, foolish, rebellious, perfect, insignificant, insecure, bad, good, worthless, hopeless, independent, needy, lonely, alone. That may be how you feel, but are any of those thoughts consistent with your identity in Christ and your holy value?

Identity, my friend, is about who God says you are.

If God was given the chance to introduce you at the party, He would say things like:

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She is MY Child. John 1:12, Romans 8:14-15
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She is Christ's friend. John 15:15

She is MY workmanship. Ephesians 2:10

She is MY coworker. 2 Corinthians 6:1

She is chosen and appointed by MY son, Jesus Christ, to bear His fruit. John 15:16

She is forgiven. Matthew 26:28, Ephesians 1:7

She is sealed with the promised Holy Spirit. Ephesians 1:13

She is a new creation. 2 Corinthians 5:17

She is alive with Christ. Ephesians 2:5

She is blessed with every spiritual blessing in heavenly places. Ephesians 1:3

She is set free. Romans 8:2, John 8:32

She is not alone and does not need to fear. Isaiah 43:1-3, Deuteronomy 31:6-8

She is victorious through the Lord Jesus Christ. 1 Corinthians 15:57

She is not controlled by the sinful nature but by the Spirit. Romans 8:9

She knows my voice and follows me. John 10:27

She has received eternal life and cannot be snatched out of MY hand. John 10:28

She is able to hear MY voice. John 8:47

She does not belong to this world. John 15:19

She belongs to ME! 1 Peter 2:9

This is your true identity! What God says about you is who you really are, even when you don't feel like it. So how come these truths don't come to your mind first? Unfortunately, your identity is often shaped by the people and circumstances that have had the greatest influence upon you.

Living with Truth as the foundation of your identity will entirely change your perspective about your life and purpose.

Since we are so quick to listen, watch, and learn from the opinions and examples of others, it is all too easy to allow stinkin' thinkin' to affect our beliefs about ourselves and God. These lies counter God's truth,

but until we recognize them as lies, they have power to negatively impact our identity and our life choices. That's why I'm going to spend the next chapter sharing with you about how to overcome stinkin' thinkin', so that you can embrace your true identity in Christ.

Heavenly Father, if those statements are really true about our identity, then why don't we feel that way? Will You show us how stinkin' thinkin' gets in the way? We ask You to open the eyes of our hearts so that we can soak in Your truth. We don't want to just learn information, but we want to have a new understanding and see our lives changed because of Your Truth. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

CHAPTER THREE

Choosing to Believe

Romans 12:2 NIV

Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world,
but be transformed by the renewing of your mind.

If you asked me what I honestly thought about myself when I was 16, I probably would have said something like this. . .

Well, I don't think I'm totally ugly or too fat or too dumb, but I'm not thin enough, pretty enough, smart enough to be good enough for

That blank could have been filled in with the name of the boy(s) I liked, my cheerleading coach, or even my parents. My perceptions were definitely shaped by what I thought others thought about of me. Looking back, I'm not surprised. As the new kid at school in fifth grade, I was teased about how I looked and even how hard I worked. In junior high, my grades kept me just out of reach of the honors classes. And, well, at home, things weren't so great. With my parents struggling in their marriage, it was easy to believe that their unhappiness had something to do with me.

What others said or did to me shaped my identity and stuck with me as a young adult. Even after becoming a Christian in college, I still had a warped perspective about myself and what I should be able to

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accomplish. I lived with a sense of regret and failure, listening to the opinions of others more than embracing the truth God offers us in the Bible. I'd say things like:

If only I could have fixed	d my parents' marriage, not made that stupid
decision in my freshman	year, gotten that score on the SATs, then I'd know
I was good enough for _	and wouldn't feel so stupid about

While my focus shifted off my appearance, I was still fixated on my performance and abilities. My identity was so impacted by my sense of failure, that it actually kept me from trying new things and pursuing opportunities.

I put my life in a box and defined myself in a way that kept me from becoming who God wanted me to be.

I suffered from stinkin' thinkin', which is when we allow anything but the Truth, as found in the Bible, to define ourselves. Our stinkin' thinkin' can form in all sorts of ways, from the seemingly insignificant moment when we were overlooked by our friends, to something way more traumatic, like the loss of parent. When life has dealt us these difficult experiences, imprint beliefs can be left on our hearts and minds, shaping how we see ourselves, God, and the world around us.

Stinkin' thinkin' can also be passed down from generation to generation, where there are certain beliefs or expectations within a family that form a mindset which is inconsistent with Scripture. Beliefs like these:

If you go to church every Sunday, God will be happy with you.

If you recycle, that makes you a better Christian because you're taking care of the planet.

If you get good grades, you will make the family look good.

If you are a starter on the soccer team, those years of playing little league were worth the investment.

If you keep your room messy, you're nothing but a slob in a pig sty.

If you have acne on your face, it's because you don't know how to take care of yourself.

If you go to youth group, you've got to be a Christian.

While some of these beliefs may have elements of truth in them, they are really false statements coming out of trying to prove worth and significance. The culture and media also offer their part in the warping of our thinking.

That cover girl model is so beautiful, but what did she look like before a graphic artist completely transformed what she looks like in real life? That house on HGTV is so perfectly organized and decorated, but is that only because no one actually lives in it?

That character on a hit TV series seems to always have the perfect best friend, so why is she so lonely in her real life?

That couple on the cover of People magazine must be in love with the way they are looking at each other, so why are they really on the brink of divorce? That Ivy League school promises a 6-figure job upon graduation, but at what cost?

These beliefs are not consistent with God's truth (John 17:17) and are lies that come straight from the devil, who is also called the Father of Lies (John 8:44).

John 17:17 NIV
Sanctify them by the truth; your word is truth.

So do you see how easy it is to be confused about our identity? Of course we're caught in between two worlds — truth and lies — because there is a spiritual battle waging for our lives. God wants us to experience the full life He has promised us, while the enemy, also called the thief, is out to steal, kill, and destroy us.

John 10:10 NIV

The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.

Satan is busy doing what he's done since the beginning of time. In the same way he tempted Eve in the Garden of Eden by causing her to doubt what God said, he continues to torment us with doubting God's truth and trying to make us believe that it is relevant to us today. Oh, but my friend, God's truth is timeless. His Word is full of wisdom and direction, hope and perspective.

I know this one teenage girl who has grown up in a Christian home, attended Sunday school since she was in diapers, and willingly goes to youth group. Yet, she struggles in her faith and swears the Bible is just too difficult to read. One the one hand, I agree with her. If you just pick up the Bible and try to make sense of it by focusing on only the verses that appeal to you, it can be pretty frustrating. It's like sitting down to watch a movie and fast-forwarding to a scene right in the middle. You have no idea what happened up to that point and forever wonder what was going on. Actually, that happened to us once. We borrowed a movie from a friend and popped it in the DVD player. The scene opened in the perfect place to make it seem like it was the start of the film. But the characters and their relationships made no sense at all. The setting was so strange and it felt like we'd missed something critical. Then suddenly, after about 45 minutes of watching this crazy movie, it ended. We were so confused. Until we checked the film length on the back of the case and realized we missed the entire first hour. So we started from the beginning and boy, did the story make a whole lot more sense now.

The Bible needs to be read in context because the whole book tells the whole story.

Yes, each individual book in the Bible (like Genesis, Isaiah, Matthew, Galatians), can be read from start to finish, but really it is like watching one scene from a movie — kind of like going to watch a YouTube clip from your favorite film. If you know the whole movie, that clip makes so much sense. If you're showing it to someone who doesn't know the

movie at all, you'll have to set up the clip in order for it to make sense, right?

So my point is this: You won't be able to really know God's truth apart from Satan's lies if you don't read your Bible to learn it for yourself. Of course, you'll also need the input and guidance of an older Christian — like a pastor, youth leader, mentor, or parent — to help you put the pieces together until you get through reading the whole Bible on your own over a number of years.

Searching for the Truth

Uncovering our true identity in Christ is about determinedly stepping out of a false belief system — stinkin' thinkin' — and into the truth. It requires being aware of every thought and putting it up against the test of Scripture. That's exactly what these two verses tell us to do:

2 Corinthians 10:5

We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God, and we take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ.

Romans 12:2

Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind.

Taking captive false beliefs and replacing them with the truth is a life skill and discipline, where we choose to embrace God's truth over what we feel or think is truth. It is like a distance runner choosing a new course, even though the old one felt just fine. On the new course, the runners have to pay attention to the terrain in order to make sure they don't stumble and fall. They will need to know when and where they'll have to pace themselves so that the uphill climbs won't wear them down.

Developing a new thinking pattern is a matter of practice and determination. It takes the ability to recognize the lies we believe along with the truths we need to embrace, and that comes through studying Scripture and the counsel of Christian mentors and parents.

For example, you might have a thought like this:

I feel so alone today.

But that thought needs to be captured and put in the context of truth, like this:

Yes, right now, right here I am alone, without another person, but I am never totally alone because I belong to God (1 Peter 2:9) and He is always with me (Deut. 31:6-8).

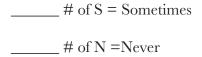
Of course, how do you know what a lie is in the first place? And how do you know where to find the Scripture truth, especially if you don't know how to study your Bible? Well, read on and you'll begin to see some of the core lies we all face and the truths we can use to overcome them.

What do you believe?

So do you know how to find out if your beliefs are based on truth? How about we take a little quiz? Don't worry, you won't be graded! Read through the list of statements below and mark each one as follows:

Can you guess how you're doing on believing lies versus the truth? Well, every one of those statements reflects a core lie. That means, for any that you marked with an A or S reflects thinking that is inconsistent with Biblical truth. Don't despair! Remember, there is no way for you to know the truth if you don't study the Scriptures. That's why we're going through this study! Like a runner in a race, we need to press on to the next mile, even if we'd like a break about now. Let's continue to look at Biblical truths so that we can demolish the lies we believe.

The Real Truth

Below you'll see of statements that include the core lie, the Biblical truth, and the verses where that truth is found.

Lie: I must be perfect. TRUTH: Christ is perfect.

Verses: Rom 3:22-23, 1 John 1:8, Psalm 18:30, Phil 3:12, Matt

4:8

Lie: I must have everyone's love and approval.

TRUTH: I am approved by God. Verses: Col 3:23-24; Gal 1:10

Lie: It is easier to avoid problems than to face them. TRUTH: God promises that this life will have problems.

Verses: Phil 3:13-14

Lie: You can have it all.

TRUTH: A yes is always a no, and a no always a yes.

Verses: 1 John 2:15-17

Lie: My worth is determined by my performance.

TRUTH: Your worth is found in Whose you are.

Verses: Psalm 139:13-14; Romans 12:3

Lie: Life should be easy.

TRUTH: We are promised trouble in this world.

Verses: John 16:33, Matt 6:34

Lie: You shouldn't have to wait for what you want.

TRUTH: Waiting is always part of life.

Verses: Gal 6:7-8; Pro 14:29

Lie: People are basically good. TRUTH: No one is good. Not one.

Verses: Jer 17:9; Matt 15:19; Rom 3:10-12; Gal 5:19-21

Lie: This relationship is hard, therefore it must be wrong.

TRUTH: Relationships are hard and we are to work together to

resolve challenges.

Verses: 1 Cor 7:28 (marriage), Heb 12:14

Lie: God's love must be earned.

TRUTH: God's love is free and unconditional.

Verses: Rom 5:8; Eph 2:8-9; John 3:16

Lie: Because I am a Christian, God will protect me from

suffering.

TRUTH: God allows us to experience suffering, trials, and pain.

Verses: 1 Pet 4:12-13, John 16:33; Phil 1:29

Lie: A good Christian doesn't feel angry, depressed, or

anxious.

TRUTH: We are emotional beings held accountable for our

actions but sometimes we need professional help to

work through our emotions.

Verses: John 11:33-35; Mark 14:32-34; Mark 11:15-16

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Lie: This always happens to me.

TRUTH: What a person does to you is more a reflection of them

than you.

Verses: Mathew 12:34; Luke 6:45

Lie: If I feel it, then it must be true.

TRUTH: Truth is not based on feelings but fact. All truth is God's

truth.

Verses: John 17:17

Can you believe this isn't even a complete list? Well, it's not. There are many more lies we believe! But this is a good starting place.

Your Turn

Can you see how important is it to pay attention to what you believe in light of what the Scripture says is true? I hope so, because in order to run this spiritual race with the stamina you'll need to finish well, you'll need to know the truth. You'll need to make the decision to practice taking captive your thoughts and making sure they line up with the truth. As you move into this habit, consider these important steps:

1. Let the Spirit Guide You

When you put your faith in Jesus, God promises to give us the Holy Spirit to lead and guide us. The Spirit draws upon the Word and prompts you how to live, reminding you of the truth. But you can easily "shush" up the Spirit if you turn to your old belief patterns and habits. Instead, spend time reading your Bible so that you can learn what God says is true. (Psalm 37:4, Proverbs 4:23, Psalm 147:3)

2. Be Careful of Influences

You will be bombarded by messages from this world as well as through your relationships with friends and teachers. Be aware of the thinking and philosophy of those around you, as well as the messages being conveyed through the media. These things will significantly influence your thinking and may entice you to make decisions contrary to God's word. (Romans 12:2, 2 Corinthians 10:13)

3. Know Your Own Flesh

Knowing your flesh is about being aware of the ways you are easily tempted to disobey God's word. Your flesh will respond to anything that looks exciting and that promises to satisfy your longing for significance. Satan plays on your fleshly desires, tempting you with lies to do what is contrary to the Holy Spirit's leading, so be sure to have accountability partners in place to help you! (Mark 14:38, 2 Timothy 2:22, 1 Corinthians 10:23, Matthew 5:14)

4. Listen to your Heart and Your Mouth

Did you know that what comes out of your mouth reveals what you think and feel? Scripture says, out of the heart the mouth speaks. So that means you can learn about what you believe based on what you say! Listen to your heart and mouth, and deal honestly with God so that you will be free to respond to the Holy Spirit's leading and be quick to obey God's Word. (Matthew 12:34)

When you begin to live out of a place of truth, your life will be transformed from the inside out.

Your identity will no longer be defined by how you feel, but by who you are — God's holy child — set apart for His good purposes.

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Those feelings of guilt or shame, hurt or frustration, insecurity or being overlooked may still rise up in you, but now you'll have a way of fighting back. With God's Word as your guide, your identity will win over your swaying feelings.

God, thank You so much for giving us Your Truth to live by. The Bible really is more than a guidebook or set of rules. It is Your love letter to us, reminding us of who we are and how we are to live in a way that brings joy, blessing, and purpose to our lives. Please help us, God, to be able to understand Your Word. Bring us teachers, who love You and know Your truth, so that they can teach us and encourage us. Give us wisdom beyond our years, so that we can live according to Your Truth without compromise. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

CHAPTER FOUR

Embracing Your Place

Romans 12:3-5 NIV

. . . For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others.

Even though I have "Member of the Track Team" included on my list of high school accomplishments, it's not exactly something I look back on with great excitement. Track wasn't my passion. It was the last resort, and the only way I could continue to be an athlete within the limitations of my own body. Dance was over, soccer was out of the question, and I quit cheerleading out of self-respect. (I'm sorry, but crawling on the gym floor towards the football team during pep rally as a part of our dance-cheer routine was not my idea of being a strong, respectable young woman. So yeah, I quit that very day.)

Each day, I'd show up to practice on time with my gear on, but I only half-heartedly wanting to be there. Sure, I wanted to win my race, but I dreaded the warm ups and conditioning exercises. I was so darn slow, and always winded, which made me feel a bit like a loser every single day. I was one insignificant girl on a team I didn't feel connected to, but was committed to fulfilling this one last requirement before graduating and moving on with the rest of my life.

It's interesting to me how my track experience paints such an accurate

picture of my real life. Sometimes, we find ourselves in situations and relationships where we feel out of place, unqualified, insignificant, and overlooked.

We may have to do things that we're not passionate about.

We may feel unqualified, yet have to fill a position or meet a need.

We may think the responsibilities are pointless and not a whole lot of fun.

We may wish we were doing something else where we can be noticed and appreciated.

We may feel this way for a day, a week, a month, or a year. Depending on our circumstances and relationships, we may wonder,

"God, why am I here? What is it that you want to do in my life? Does this have to go on this way?"

Trust me. Most days I showed up to track practice feeling nothing but sadness. After 13 years of dancing, with up to three hours a day invested three days a week, I had nothing to show for it. Just memories and lost dreams. I was the youngest to go on pointe in my class and was about to join the competitive dance team — a dream I had from the time I was little. But instead, I had a freak accident that wrecked my knee. At the time, we thought it was just a little dislocation and with a brace, I'd be back to normal after it healed. But then it happened again a few months later. And again. I recovered and quickly learned all my dance routines in time for the recital, only to dislocate it the week before. I was done. No matter how much I wanted to continue, my body had other plans and my life course was re-routed.

When Our Course is Re-routed

I'm certainly not alone in this experience of having a dream dashed. Living at a boarding and day college prep school for the last 17 years has given me a broader perspective on how often we're called to surrender our dreams and give up our passions, even as teens. I can think of a dozen athletes that were destined for college scholarships, and some even got them, who suffered an unlikely injury at the worst time. It turned their competitive course in a new direction, while stripping away their dreams and sometimes their identity, too.

Whether you're an athlete or a musician, the class president or a servant leader, the girl with a dozen best friends you've known since preschool or one super close friend you've made since moving to your new hometown, you've likely been in a situation where you've defined yourself by your accomplishments and dreams. . . and then suddenly that one thing is no longer is a part of your life.

You know that feeling of being crushed. You know how naked it feels to walk out of your home, without the comfort of your identity rooted in what you do. You know what it feels like to be the one who is overlooked because you can no longer contribute the way you once did.

The process of surrender is the ripping away of what you want — or who you thought you were — and allowing God to accomplish His purposes in you and through you in a different way.

Oh, surrender hurts! But we must grieve the loss and embrace the new beginning. We can shed a few messy tears on our parent's shoulders — and we definitely should, because keeping our feelings all stuffed away isn't healthy. And we can cry out to God, telling Him about our disappointments. He can handle our temper tantrums. Look at the Psalms. They are filled with fits of disappointment, giving us permission to be honest with God. And yet the Psalmist moves from sadness to embracing God's purposes. How? By forming new thoughts in line with God's character and eternal purpose.

Psalm 42:5 NIV Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me? Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise him, my Savior and my God.

The Psalmist is honest, admitting his downcast feelings, but in the same breath turns his mind to remember the truth — that he can put his hope in God. Throughout the Psalms, we see reminders of God's faithfulness, provisions, and plans, even in the midst of difficult circumstances. When we take our thoughts captive and replace them with God's truth, like the Psalmist, then we position ourselves to see the new thing God is doing in our lives. This is the exact moment in which God takes us from a place of despair to a place of hope — where we can see new opportunities. This is how we can begin seeing our significance in light of God's new purposes for our lives.

Overlooked and disappointed isn't where you or I are meant to live.

God intended better than that for each one of us, but it requires a willingness on our part to embrace the race — our life race — even as the course changes. How do we do that? By defining ourselves according to our identity in Christ instead of by what we accomplish or who we are connected, too.

Being a Part of Something Bigger

Have you ever noticed that when you're a part of something — like a team, club, or program — it gives you a sense of belonging and worth. When we are forced off a team because of an injury, or out of a community because our family has to move, we're left feeling both alone and overlooked.

Until we find our place to belong, there will always be an emptiness inside of us.

Well, that's not really a bad thing, because God did design us to need each other — but more importantly than needing a club or a team,

God wants us to be connected with the body of Christ. In the Bible, God describes the family of God as the Body of Christ, and compares the many parts in His family with the many parts that make up our own physical body. Take a minute to read carefully how God describes the significance of our part in the body of Christ.

1 Corinthians 12:12-31 MSG

You can easily enough see how this kind of thing works by looking no further than your own body. Your body has many parts—limbs, organs, cells—but no matter how many parts you can name, you're still one body. It's exactly the same with Christ. By means of his one Spirit, we all said good-bye to our partial and piecemeal lives. We each used to independently call our own shots, but then we entered into a large and integrated life in which he has the final say in everything. . .

I want you to think about how all this makes you more significant, not less. A body isn't just a single part blown up into something huge. It's all the different-but-similar parts arranged and functioning together. If Foot said, "I'm not elegant like Hand, embellished with rings; I guess I don't belong to this body," would that make it so? If Ear said, "I'm not beautiful like Eye, limpid and expressive; I don't deserve a place on the head," would you want to remove it from the body? If the body was all eye, how could it hear? If all ear, how could it smell? As it is, we see that God has carefully placed each part of the body right where he wanted it.

But I also want you to think about how this keeps your significance from getting blown up into selfimportance. For no matter how significant you are, it is only because of what you are a part of.

An enormous eye or a gigantic hand wouldn't be a body, but a monster. What we have is one body with many parts, each its proper size and in its proper place. No part is important on its own. Can you imagine Eye telling Hand, "Get lost; I don't need you"? Or, Head telling Foot, "You're fired; your job has been phased out"? As a matter of fact, in practice it works the other way—the "lower" the part, the more basic, and therefore necessary. You can live without an eye, for instance, but not without a stomach. When

it's a part of your own body you are concerned with, it makes no difference whether the part is visible or clothed, higher or lower. You give it dignity and honor just as it is, without comparisons. If anything, you have more concern for the lower parts than the higher. If you had to choose, wouldn't you prefer good digestion to full-bodied hair?

The way God designed our bodies is a model for understanding our lives together as a church: every part dependent on every other part, the parts we mention and the parts we don't, the parts we see and the parts we don't. If one part hurts, every other part is involved in the hurt, and in the healing. If one part flourishes, every other part enters into the exuberance.

Can't you see how God desperately wants you to move into a complete understanding of your significance as you find your place in the body of Christ?

Your part in the family of God is priceless.

Your part is necessary and valuable, but it's not dependent on how good you are, how much you can do, or when you exceed everyone's wildest expectations. Your part is based on how God has made you and the way in which you can serve as you surrender your life to Him.

If you read further along in 1 Corinthians 12, you'll see that God appoints each person with a different gift — a different way of participating in the family of God. These gifts aren't exactly like a job, where you show up with skills and qualifications. You don't get trained in order to get your gifts either. The spiritual gifts are given by God for His purposes. They are designed to meet the needs within the family of God, but also can bless and serve those who've yet to know Him. The list of gifts are kind of unusual, too, as they aren't things we get to open up but are rather something we become — like apostles, prophets, teachers, miracle workers, healers, helpers, organizers, those who pray in tongues. But before you panic about what these gifts mean and which one you may have, keep this in mind:

Figuring out the gift God has put inside of you may be impossible because you've yet to experience

enough life to recognize the way God intends to use you in the family of God.

So rather than looking at the list of gifts and wondering which one is yours, remind yourself of this perspective:

"Well, I don't know what gift God has given me, but I know He's promised to give each one of us a gift to use in the body of Christ, so I'll just keep looking for ways to connect and serve the body until I discover which one is mine."

Your spiritual gift is only a clue pointing to your life purpose. God has also put together your personality, skills, and talents. He's orchestrated your experiences, family, and friendships. All of these things come together to both reveal your life purpose and the ways God wants to use you on this earth.

One day you'll see what God is up to. As you embrace this race — your life race — you'll discover your significance is based on the way God uniquely designed you to fit into His family, and to draw others into His family. Then you'll realize that what you do and how you do it isn't as important as where He's put you and how He's made you to live. If you live surrendered to His plans, you'll have no regrets.

How Do You Embrace Your Place?

So how exactly do you embrace your place in God's family when you don't really know what you've been made to do? There's no perfect formula, but there are steps you can take to move forward. Like building blocks, you can work through the process of embracing your identity in Christ while learning how to take captive your thoughts to make them line up with God's truth. As you get comfortable living that way, you can add on these steps:

1. Watch Out for the Rejection Stamp

The hurt that comes from feeling insignificant and overlooked stems from a desire to belong to something greater than ourselves. The trouble really comes when the great big rejection stamp pounds down on our lives with a simple little lie from the Enemy imprinted in our soul: You don't matter to anyone, not now, not ever. Nothing could be further from the truth! You matter first and foremost to God. He created you and designed you for a unique purpose. When Satan's condemning thoughts wrestle out the truth, an imprint is left in your heart and mind, reshaping your identity and rerouting your calling. This is why you must guard your thoughts, so that only the Truth will impact your soul and the rejection stamp will leave no mark on you. (John 8:44, 2 Corinthians 10:5)

2. Get With a Godly Friend or Family Member and Pray!

Sometimes the best help in moving out of a place of feeling insignificant is through having a friend, mentor, or family member encourage you through the hard times. When you're stuck in a place of feeling defeated, reach out to another Christian to confess your feelings and pray together. God uses prayer as a way to heal our hurting hearts, so turn to Him with the help of someone you can trust. (James 5:16, Romans 8:26, 12:12; Ephesians 1:16-18, 3:16-20)

3. Reach Out, Reach Beyond

When your focus becomes about me, myself, and I, you'll end up feeling more and more sad and worthless. So make the decision to reach out to others and reach beyond your circumstances, even before you feel like doing so. If you've brought your disappointments to God and spent time in prayer, with a trusted mentor or parent, then make the decision to step out in faith as you embrace the new race before you. Maybe you can even reach others who feel overlooked or insignificant. The Bible tells us that God wants us to comfort

others, especially after we've been comforted by Him:

2 Corinthians 1:3-5 MSG

He comes alongside us when we go through hard times, and before you know it, he brings us alongside someone else who is going through hard times so that we can be there for that person just as God was there for us.

So is God asking you to reach out to someone who is experiencing what you've experienced?

God has a purpose for your life, friend. Even if you feel like it's been thrown off the side of a cliff, it doesn't mean you're going to come crashing to the ground.

Maybe God's plans for you include a wildly magnificent rescue, where He swoops in, catches you in the palm of His hands, and transports you to an entirely new place.

He fills your life with amazing new opportunities — ones you you would have never known if the course stayed the same.

So will you let Him direct your steps as you run the race He's marked out for you?

The Journey to Freedom Begins

Do you see the finish line of this study right in front you? Well, here we are. . . all done except for a few remaining questions. You've made it through four full chapters of information, and hopefully, you now have a brand new understanding of what it means to be a child of God. You've gained a new perspective about how to figure out if what you feel is actually true, and how to kick those annoying lies to curb. And, you've been given the opportunity to think about how to respond to life's disappointments while also finding purpose by being a perfectly unique and needed member in the family of God.

Can you believe that in such a short time you've been given so much

information to use on this life journey — this journey of freedom!

John 8:32 NIV
Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.

Now you can decide for yourself what you want to believe. You can make wise decisions about how you want to live. You can find joy in embracing your God-given purposes on this earth!

So are you ready to run — to press on — and finish the race before you?

Are you ready to share with the world about how you've discovered your identity in Christ?

Girls, if it is the journey to freedom you want, then embrace what God says about you. It is His opinion that matters most. In His truth your freedom is found.

Heavenly Father, it is so hard to not know Your plans for our lives. When things go off course and we find ourselves losing our dreams, we just want to crumble up in a pity party of tears. But God, please comfort us in this moment. Show us that there is more to life than what we think we wanted or feel we needed. Show us, Lord, the ways you're working in us and through us, even in an unlikely situation. Help us to surrender our plans to You. Help us to embrace this race you've set out for us to run, and find delight in fulfilling your purposes. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

Time to Stretch Questions

1. Have you faced a situation or circumstance, which left you feeling overlooked, insignificant, or disappointed? Take some time to consider how you felt and what you learned from that situation or experience. But don't stop there. Also consider what God might have to say about it. Record your thoughts below.

2. When you look back on your life, can you see times in which God has redirected your life course? Looking at it from this perspective, can you see His purposes or are you still wondering? What Bible verse might capture what God is doing in you or through you as it relates to this experience?

3. What are your thoughts about God's faithfulness? Do you think He'll come through for you or leave you disappointed? Do you trust Him to meet your needs and love you unconditionally? Share how you really feel and also ask God to give you His perspective.

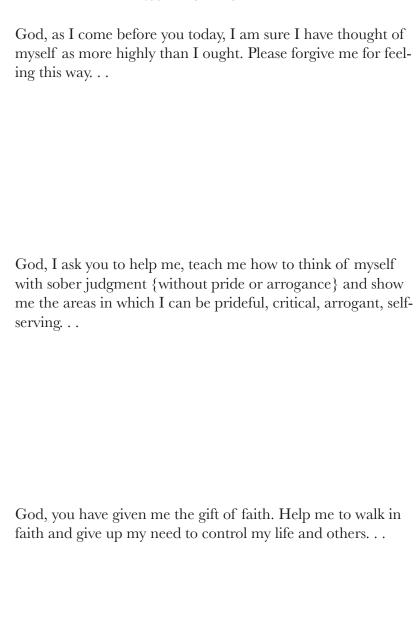

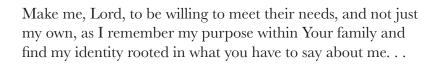
